Race to the top!

Two 100ft Douglas Fir poles from the Bedale valley on the Wykeham Estate have been craned into place at the Great Yorkshire Showground. They will be used in the spectacular Great British Pole Climbing Championships on 12 July. Sponsored by Dawnay Estates for the next three years, climbers race to the top of the poles in seconds.

"These poles replace the ones we donated in 2014," explains James Stephenson, Head of Property and Sporting. "We use Douglas Firs because they are tall and produce straight timber. Each pole is around 80 years old and weighs over six tons."

In April the roads, lakes and skies in and around North Yorkshire Water Park were a flurry of activity. Fire and Rescue Service's water rescue teams, police and police divers, HM Coastguard, Yorkshire Ambulance Service, Helicopter Emergency Medical Service and Scarborough and Ryedale Mountain Rescue Team descended on the waterpark. The reason? One of the largest water-based training exercises in the North of England.

This was a multi-agency response to a fictional major incident and included drones and even helicopters. The water park was closed to the public, but the staff were on hand to lend their expertise and even act as would-be casualties. Representatives from the Armed Forces assessed the response using the JESIP framework, the gold standard for multi-agency working.

"As a volunteer for Filey Coastguard, I know how important it is to practise for major incidents," says Operations Manager James Whitehead. "We were proud to offer our site and staff to help the emergency services hone their specialist skills - and serve up some well earned bacon sarnies from our café once everyone was rescued!"



Our ecological oasis

When the North Yorkshire Water Park was enlarged two years ago, some feared the area's ecosystem would be affected. However a recent report shows wildlife is flourishing.

Dawnay Estates has also teamed up with local experts to help the UK's most threatened resident bird, spotted last year in this area for the first time.



"It seems the wildlife has simply moved to quieter areas away from the main water sports lake. Hansons, who have been quarrying locally for more than 40 years, have kindly sponsored information boards along the main circular walk to share ecological insights with visitors."









The Estate regularly hosts a charity Clay Pigeon Shoot for up to 40 teams of four competing around Wykeham Estate. The event has raised more than £205,000 since 2017. This year's beneficiaries were Support Dogs, the Game and Wildlife Conservation Trust and Scarborough and Ryedale Mountain Rescue.

"Once again we were lucky with the weather" says Head of Property and Sporting James Stephenson. "The teams enjoyed the challenges of the different terrains across the Estate, as well as the champagne reception and lunch, followed by a charity auction, in the grounds of Wykeham Abbey. Support Dog "Dawnay" was the special guest and we are delighted that this year we raised £55,000 for the charities."

Ever green, ever brown and ever vigilant

This spring Wykeham Mature Plants nursery was proud to be accredited as Plant Healthy by the Plant Health Alliance whose members include the RHS and The National Trust. The scheme aims to stop the import and spread of destructive pests and diseases which haven't yet reached the UK's shores. Records, processes and procedures, including quarantine measures, were scrutinised during in-person inspections.

"With the Xyella fastidiosa bacteria, spruce bark beetle and other serious pests now threatening a wide range of species on the European mainland, it is vital we play our part," explains General Manager Adam Smith. "The journey to accreditation was definitely worthwhile. Being Plant Healthy

reassures both the government's PHCS - 0029 - UK Animal and Plant Health Agency and our customers of our commitment to supply healthy, disease-free mature trees and shrubs."

Healthy

The popularity of the nursery's instant hedging plants continues to soar. As does interest in 'everbrown' hornbeam and beech to conceal unsightly views and ugly buildings nearby. "Theoretically these trees are deciduous, but they often retain their leaves during winter," says Adam. "This makes them ideal for privacy screening. As they are not evergreen, there are also fewer planning issues surrounding their planting."

The North Yorkshire Water Park may be the North of England's largest aqua adventure park. But there's a huge range of dry land activities too. The new 'Adventure Wood'

hosts bushcraft, woodland crafting, pond-dipping and foraging sessions as well as a low ropes course. Archery, laser tag and axe-throwing open later this summer.
